Business Notes

- Budget
 - After a valiant struggle, county board representative for libraries, Bryce Luchterhand has managed to convince financial committee members that libraries should receive an increase in county support from 73% to 78% of our circ cost to township residents. This is pending a final budget vote in October.
 - I am hoping that this 78% increase will help us to cover some additions to the budget that I'd like to add, including buying better DVD cases for all new DVDs and possibly hiring a cleaning person. The latter has been requested repeatedly by the staff.
- Oz Party
 - We spent just under \$300 on the Oz party. Nancy donated about \$60 worth of supplies, which brings up down to \$240. This did fit nicely into our public relations budget of \$500.
 - The Oz party went really well. Wish we could have had more kids. It seems everyone was camping that weekend. Now we have to decide if we want to do a similar event next year (Alice's Tea Party?) and if we want to consider a different date.

Director's Report

- Staff

- Collection Development Update
 - I am feeling the need to make some changes to our collection. I've been doing a fair amount of weeding since I started four years ago, but the time has come for some more significant collection changes. We need to do a major weeding of the adult and juvenile nonfiction. As more information is becoming available online there is less need to hold onto dated material. At the same time, our DVD and graphic novel collections are rapidly expanding and the demand is unlikely to diminish any time soon. So we will be weeding and shift the diminished collections to make room for the growing collections.
 - \circ $\,$ Top 5 things to say when people are horrified that the library is getting rid of books:
 - They have been sitting on our shelves gathering dust for years. It's wonderful that these books can be found and used by new readers now.
 - Some materials need to be replaced with a newer copies if they are in poor condition or have outdated information.
 - Even if we get rid of our copy of a book, it can still be ordered through interlibrary loan.
 - Nobody wants to check out outdated books in poor condition. When we remove them from our shelves it gives people a chance to see other books that may have been overlooked because they were surrounded by ratty looking books.
 - Our space is limited. If we want to keep all our books, we have to stop buying new ones.
